A) God We b	the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit (The Holy Trinity) pelieve the biblical revelation testifies that there is only one God, and that He is eternally ent in Three Persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
2.	God The Father - God the Father is the Creator and sustainer of all things and He created the universe, in love, to respond to Him. He created man in His own image for the fellowship and called men back to Himself through Christ after the rebellion and fall of man. The Son - Jesus Christ is eternally God. He was together with the Father and the Holy Spirit from the beginning and through Him all things were made. For man's redemption He left heaven and became incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary; henceforth, He is fully God and fully man. The Holy Spirit - The Holy Spirit is God, the Lord and giver of life, who was active in the Old Testament and given to the Church in fullness at Pentecost. He empowers the saints for service and witness, cleanses man from the old nature and conforms us to the image of Christ. The baptism in the Holy Spirit, subsequent to conversion, releases the fullness of the Spirit and is evidenced by the fruits and gifts of the Holy Spirit.
